






# ESTHER THE BEAUTIFUL

Esther is the third star point. She illustrates justice, courage and fidelity to kindred and friends. She is symbolized by the white sash to make her known to all proper inquires the light, knowledge and beauty of the white ray which symbolizes light, purity and joy.

Her badge is the crown and scepter within a triangle which is an emblem of royalty and power. This reminds us of Esther's courage to save her people and the king's fidelity and justice. Her Hebrew name is Hadassah. Her Persian name is derived from the Persian word for star which is Esther.

# "Let's get a little history about Esther"

King Xerxes of Persia was the world's most powerful monarch who ruled the Persian Empire around 486B. C. During the third year of Xerxes reign, he had a huge festival so that he could display all of his wealth to the high ranking governors and officials of his empire. King Xerxes also had a wife named Queen Vashti, and she was holding a celebration for the women of the empire. As the ceremonies progressed, King Xerxes summoned Queen Vashti so that he could show off her beauty to the people in attendance. Instead of appearing before the king the queen refused to listen to her husband's request. Since she was disobedient to her King, Queen Vashti was forever banished from his presence.

King Xerxes had to send out a decree that women were not to follow her example. He did this to avoid civil unrest that could have resulted from massive domestic abuse and chaos within the empire.

This story sets the background for the rise of an extremely beautiful woman named Esther and her godly cousin Mordecai. 
Prime Minister Haman also decided to build a 75 foot tall hanging platform for Mordecai.

# North Carolina



North Carolina is located in the southeastern region of the United States. North Carolina is the 28th largest and 9th-most populous of the 50 United States. It is bordered by Virginia to the north, the Atlantic Ocean to the east, Georgia and South Carolina to the south, and Tennessee to the west. Raleigh is the state's capital and Charlotte is its largest city. The Charlotte metropolitan area, with an estimated population of 2,569,213 in 2018, is the most populous metropolitan area in North Carolina, the 23rd-most populous in the United States, and the largest banking center in the nation after New York City. The Raleigh metropolitan area is the second-largest metropolitan area in the state, with an estimated population of 1,362,540 in 2018, and is home to the largest research park in the United States, Research Triangle Park.

The University of North Carolina Chapel Hill is the oldest State University in the United States. In 1903 the Wright Brothers made the first successful powered flight by man at Kill Devil Hill near Kitty Hawk. The Wright Memorial at Kitty Hawks now commemorates their achievement. High Point is known as the Furniture Capital of the World.

Raleigh is the capital of the state of North Carolina and the seat of Wake County in the United States. Raleigh is the second-largest city in the state, after Charlotte. Raleigh is known as the "City of Oaks" for its many oak trees, which line the streets in the heart of the city. The city covers a land area of 142.8 square miles (370 km2). The U.S. Census Bureau estimated the city's population as 469,298 as of July 1, 2018. It is one of the fastest-growing cities in the country. The city of Raleigh is named after Sir Walter Raleigh, who established the lost Roanoke Colony in present-day Dare County.

Raleigh is an early example in the United States of a planned city. Following the American Revolutionary War when the US gained independence, this was chosen as the site of the state capital in 1788 and incorporated in 1792 as such. The city was originally laid out in a grid pattern with the North Carolina State Capitol in Union Square at the center.

Raleigh has a population of 449,477 and is one of the best places to live in North Carolina. Living in Raleigh offers residents a suburban feel and most residents own their homes. There are a plethora lot of restaurants, coffee shops, and parks. It is always voted one of the best place to live in America, and the reason why is ridiculously obvious. # Venecia C. Bessellieu Research and Education Chapter Holds Historic Inaugural Meeting

Having a great vision in early 2015, then Grand Worthy Matron Venecia C. Bessellieu made a recommendation in her Stewardship Address to establish a Research and Education Chapter within Georgiana Thomas Grand Chapter (GTGC) to work in conjunction with the David A. McWilliams Research and Education Lodge. The purpose and goal of the Research and Education Chapter is to conduct research specific to the GTGC of the District of Columbia and its subordinate chapters. At the 124<sup>th</sup> Annual Communication of GTGC in December 2016, the Grand Body approved the naming of the Chapter after GWM Venecia C. Bessellieu, thus the name of the chapter became the Venecia C. Bessellieu Research and Education Chapter (VCBREC) and requested that By-Laws be developed and brought back for final approval. The following members got busy developing those By-Laws for VCBREC: PM Catrice R. Vandross (C-5), Chairperson, PGWM G. Delores Ellerbe (C-4), Co-Chairperson, PM J. Felicia Alexander (C-15), PGWM Margaret E. Anderson (C-6), PM Norma J. Brooks (C-11), Sis. Christine Vaughn (C-5), AP Milford Alphonso (Al), and Vaughn, Jr. (C-5)

After two years of working diligently to develop the guidelines and subsequent By-Laws for this "hybrid" chapter, and after several rejections, at the 126<sup>th</sup> Annual Communication of GTGC, under the leadership of then GWM Patricia L. Young, the VCBREC By-Laws were approved by the Grand Body and GWM Young appointed the following officers: Worthy Matron: PM Catrice R. Vandross (C-5), Worthy Patron: Bro. Milford Al Vaughn (C-5), Associate Matron: PGWM G. Delores Ellerbe (C-4), Associate Patron: WP Kenneth Pough (C-14), Conductress: PGWM Margaret E. Anderson (C-6), Associate Conductress: PM LaJuan O.G. Hunter (C-14), Treasurer: PGWM Patricia L. Young (C-1), Secretary: PM Norma J. Brooks (C-11), Marshal: Sis. Christine Vaughn (C-5), Sentinel: PAP James L. Vandross, Sr. (C-5), and Warder: PM J. Felicia Alexander (C-15).

This new entity within GTGC is not a chartered chapter but is comprised of current members of the 15 subordinate chapters who are dedicated to the research and education of the beautiful allegories of Eastern Stardom, in general, and the Georgiana Thomas Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, PHA for the Jurisdiction of the District of Columbia and its Jurisdiction, in particular, to illuminate the Order and be better agents of change and service in our community.

The VCBREC will assist in educating, collecting, compiling, and preserving the history of the GTGC. Members will also assist in providing light and knowledge to educate our membership on the importance of preserving our collective histories, and will research and collect data from various sources to assist the 15 subordinate chapters in the preparation and compilation of their historic highlights and their various research endeavors. There are three types of membership in VCBREC: Research, General, and Honorary.


A Research Member is one who has completed the required research guidelines. She must have written and presented a research paper, or have conducted a seminar/workshop, or provided light and knowledge in open session within the VCBREC or the Phyllis Chapter. Research Members are eligible to hold elective office.

A General Member is an active member of the Eastern Star who pays dues. S(he) will have a voice and can vote in VCBREC. General membership of a Sister is any Eastern Star who is a member of a GTGC subordinate chapter in good standing. She is eligible to hold an appointed office in VCBREC. General Membership of a Master Mason is any Brother who is a member in good standing of one of the warranted lodges of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of DC and a member of a GTGC subordinate chapter in good standing. He is eligible to hold office in VCBREC.

An Honorary Member is an active member of the Order of the Eastern Star of a Prince Hall Affiliated Jurisdiction. Membership may be granted to individuals who have provided distinguished service to VCBREC. Honorary members will have the right to present their valuable research in our Jurisdiction, but Honorary Members are not eligible to hold office within VCBERC. # Member At Large

My life as a volunteer started long before my journey in the Order of the Eastern Stars. As a child my father Mervin Aird made doing good deeds and giving back to others fun and a permanent part of our lives. I remember from an early age volunteering with him at the orphanage for Disabled children. My father would dress up as Santa Claus every Christmas, we had a donkey cart and reindeer antlers on the donkey. He would ride up the street and we would give out toys to the children from all around town. He was also a member of the Seafront Lions Club, so we were always volunteering somewhere collecting glasses, washing cars, giving out food; it just was a part of my everyday life.

When I came to America my passion for helping people in need didn't waiver. Everywhere I went there always seemed to be a need for people that just wanted a hand up. My father would always say "it's never a hand out Carole, always a hand up", so that is where my journey began. My grandmother would always say "learn something new every day so you don't waste a day, and in order to do that you have to surround yourself with people. Meet new people every day no matter if they were educated or not. Pay no mine to where they lived or where they were from. Everyone has a story and a lesson to be learned inside them that they are just waiting to share." About 15 years ago my husband William T. Reynolds III who served in the U.S. Air Force and I were stationed at Fort Meade, Maryland. I was substitute teaching at Mead Middle School at the time and I thought to myself, "What can I do to give back to the students?" After a long talk with my husband, we became mentors.

It all started with some of my friends and they're teenaged children coming to my

house after school. The kids loved spending time at my house because I was always doing some sort of arts and crafts. Because of my upbringing on the island of Trinidad, I learned a lot of things not commonly done in the so-called civilized world. I used some of my ancient knowledge to teach the kids things like, how to take lint from the drying machine and make paper. At first they thought I was crazy, but once they all made paper from the lint they thought it was pretty cool. The word quickly got out that I was spending time with some of the students. It didn't take long before a large group of students came to me and asked if I would create a dance/step team as an after school activity.

Once again, I spoke with my husband who always supports me and he agreed just as long as the school approved of it. I informed the students that I would talk to the principal to get permission and support from the school administration to see if we could make this happen. After speaking with the principal and explaining what the kids were asking for he agreed with one stipulation; I had to open it up to all students. I was overjoyed that I would be able to create something the students wanted to participate in at the school that had never existed. The principal was so onboard with the idea, he helped me create the flyers to be posted around the school. He also announced over the school intercom that afternoon that anyone who was interested in joining the school step team to meet in the school gym after school. To our surprise one hundred students showed up in the gym that day after school.

My husband and I knew very quickly that we could not do this without some help. We decided to reach out to some of our friends 20 who were members of Greek sororities that

Were accustomed to stepping since I knew nothing about stepping. Someone somewhere once said "Build it, and they will come". With the help of several of our friends our efforts to start a small program after school evolved into something much greater than I anticipated. We eventually became "It Takes a Village". The evolution of our rag tag organization increased the number of children coming out to join the step team. Those who didn't meet the step criteria wanted to know could we start a choir, then we were asked to provide math tutors. I did not know how to say 'NO' because I've always been able to find help for anyone in need. My husband and I soon realized that the children we provided opportunities for in Baltimore were lacking cultural history and cultural pride.

Overtime our request from the students became greater, we were not just filling the gym and providing our services as step instructors, my husband became a choir director, and we also had one of our students who was a black belt in karate who wanted to start a self-defense class, which evolved into a young gentleman's club teaching self-esteem and character building. With the assistance of many adult volunteers we decided to take our group on a cultural field trip. So we came up with a plan to take all the students on a train ride to Washington D.C. to see the Black and Wax museum, the African Museum and the American Heritage Museum. We didn't know that none of the children in our group had ever been on a train. The excitement from the kids on the train let me know that all my work was not in vain. The parents of the students in our group were very grateful because there children were excelling in school due to the requirements we put in place that everyone in our group must have at least an overall C average in order to participate in any of our events.

I remember just before we left Maryland we decided to do our career day at Meade Middle School, the children had just done a school pro gram that categorized them into groups by their test scores. The goal was to compare students in America to those in Korea. The results of the program showed that Korean school systems believed that African American children were only going to be good at jobs as plumbers and welders, etc. Although we all need such professions we could see what those results did to the children's self-esteem. Here was a group of children from another ethnic background whose families are pushing them to be doctors and lawyers telling them that they would only be good for manual professions.

After witnessing this catastrophic mental and emotional opinionated display by people from another country of what our children should aspire to be, I told my students to write me letters explaining what they wanted to be when they grow up. Thirty five children and I went out into the community, and with the help of my husband and our team we found mentors in all the career fields that were presented to us to come and speak to our students so they could see that it can be done. Over the years we have followed the paths the children of our program have chosen and were proud to see that the majority of them have blossomed into beautiful, talented and prosperous young adults. All good things must come to an end.

My husband received orders to Hawaii and my family and I moved to the Island of Oahu. Not long after arriving in Hawaii my husband became a Prince Hall Mason. I was never the type of person to be attached to groups but my husband eventually persuaded me to become a member of the Prince Hall Order of Eastern Star. In 2005 I put my petition in for membership and was accepted and became a member of Cosmopolitan Chapter Number One, Prince Hall Order of Eastern Stars of Hawaii, Right of Adoption, Inc.

I had some of the greatest mentors in the world who are now deceased. The first Grand Worthy Matron of Hawaii sister Vivian Rich Hill whose legacy was too always be a lady. Then there was Sister Sheila Scott who reminded me that when you see a sister, you cannot judge her because you don't know the journey she's been traveling on. Also, to always greet each person you meet the way you would want them to greet you.

Sister Mary Nelson, she would pop my legs if I did not cut those corners or if I stepped out of my chair the wrong way. Sister Nelson taught me that the ritual even if it seems redundant at times was the discipline that created the spirit of unity.

Through the order I soon realized that I now had women who were for the most part likeminded. We had a heart of a servant, we had the spirit of a giver, and we had teachers that taught us our purpose as servants to our communities and by our oaths we were bound to protect one another.

It has been 14 years since I first joined the order. It doesn't even seem that long, but over the years I have watched young woman bloom from the seeds that I have planted. I have wanted to give up many times but I have learned many things about myself along this journey. There are many women like I once was that need sisterhood and the right mentors to help guide them along their journey. The Order of Eastern Stars has been that light in the east that has guided me into being a better women, wife and friend to my husband and mother of my children.

There was something my grandmother shared with me many years ago, or what I realized one day, or it was just something I had learned about my own self along my journey. When you don't open your heart or your hands you cannot receive, nor can you give. So I walk around all day figuratively of course, always looking for an opportunity to serve. Being an eastern star has been an honor. Although there have been rough times, the good days outweigh the bad days so I won't complain. I am always ready to serve.

The presenter must determine if the presentation will be in the format of:

Lecture
Demonstration
Lecture/Demonstration
Lecture with participant participation

In addition to the four workshop categories listed in number 1 (one), members may submit materials they would like to present for entertainment, such as a relaxer, skit, quiz, game, recitation, etc. These activities will be used as fillers between workshops and will be limited in number.
